

A Time For Everything

Synopsis: This adapted Scripture reading makes its subtle point just by restructuring the familiar Ecclesiastes reading to show the positive and negative sides of life separately, and then in their natural integration.

Themes: Balance, Wisdom, Time, Perspective, Maturity.

Time requirements: 5 minutes

Characters:

1 Positive and optimistic

2- Grieved, wounded, slightly cynical.

Props: These lines can be done memorized, or Readers Theater style with scripts in script folders. Nothing else is necessary.



Author's Note:

Scene opens on both actors facing the audience. 1 starts while 2 listens skeptically, then vice versa.

Blocking: Keep the actors on separate sides of the stage to contract their perspectives. Start them far apart and then bring them gradually closer together at the end.

Author's Note: Here they both study each other curiously before trying again; this time more thoughtfully. As they react to each other the effect is neither overly happy nor sad. They bring balance to each other.

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Devotional Thought: Hebrew wisdom literature has a sort of high/low balance to it where the extremes of life are not scaled down to a bland average, but celebrated in their opposites. In other words happiness and sadness aren't supposed to blend into a boring neutrality, devoid of emotion. It's more like the heights and the depths need each other for perspective. We see that here in this famous reading from Ecclesiastes. God brings seasons into our lives at his discretion and we can welcome, even savor, both the good and the bad.

Scripture Link: Though this is taken from Ecclesiastes 3, it's in keeping with the entire tone of the book which tends to swing from wild optimism and celebration to deep despair. It's the Hebrew way.
